Tracey Bournier

To have lived through the Chc EQ is one thing. To be galvanized to action is another.

Tracey Bournier a central city acupuncturist found her clinic 'red stickered' following the first quake so when a fellow practitioner, Piedad Barillias opened her home as a community clinic, she was quick to volunteer her services. When the Linwood Resource Centre was offered an number of acupuncturists set a community clinic here, offering free acupuncture, to all who came.

“It was pretty intensive in the beginning. In came a number of injured people who hadn't made it to the doctors due to cost or accessibility.

We had people who hadn't slept in days, people who had seen things in the central city that they couldn't get out of their heads. High blood pressure, anxiety, and high stress were other common issues seen at the Linwood clinic. Acupuncture helped them to relax a little. When we first started up, a 'reverential' silence prevailed in the large hall where we were treating. After just a couple of weeks it became much more. It became a place where friendships started, people helping people and the healing grew.”

Tracey's generosity with her time preceded the free clinic, which she continued for two and a half years. She was the vice president of the New Zealand Register of Acupuncturists during this time and also can be applauded for dedicating many hours to the writing of the acupuncture treatment profiles for ACC, published in 2006.

The William Wong Doo Award, for services to the profession and has been presented to Tracey in recognition of her many contributions. “It is great to be able to recognize such people in this way” says Olatunji, director of NZSATCM and the award's sponsor.

Tracey splits her time between a Christchurch clinic and clinic in Hamner where she now lives.

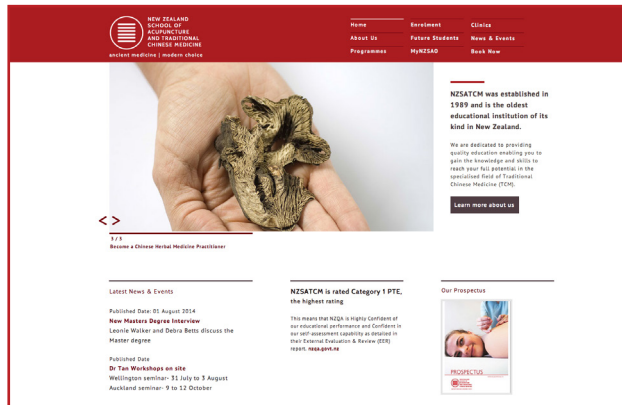
